
OUR WORK LOCATIONS

ONGOING MEETINGS BETWEEN A COMMITTED GROUP OF MUSLIMS AND CHRISTIANS

"I hate Muslims," Bob said to two of our staff in Wisconsin. He had heard that they had worked in a Muslim country and that they were offering opportunities to meet Muslims from the city.

Around that time, the church hosted a Muslim-Christian panel discussion, and Bob signed up. "Well, I say I'm a follower of Jesus and that I hate Muslims. These two things cannot go together, so I'd better show up and figure this out if I intend to keep following Jesus."

A dinner group soon formed between Muslims and Christians from that event. Stories and meals were shared and turns were taken hosting one another. Then Bob opened up one night after dinner to a Muslim participant: "I have to tell you something. Before I came to this group, I hated Muslims and I wanted nothing to do with them... Now, I love you."

EVENTS HOSTED AT A MOSQUE OR CHURCH FOR ATTENDEES TO LEARN ABOUT TEACHINGS AND PRACTICES OF THE OTHER FAITH'S COMMUNITY

Christian and Muslim teenagers gathered in Indiana for food, games, and peer discussion about the similarities and differences between their respective faiths. Conversations ranged from whether or not faith is part of their identity or something that can be changed, to whether religion has been a force for good or evil in the world.

MEALS BETWEEN CHRISTIANS AND MUSLIMS, INCLUDING AN EDUCATIONAL CULTURAL PRESENTATION OR EXPERIENCE

528 PEOPLE The Light of Nations Christian School in Indonesia brought 30 elementary students to our Indonesia team's Peace Generation facility to learn about Islam. Some of the Christian students knew absolutely nothing about Islam despite living in a city that is 98% Muslim, but others knew Arabic phrases even our volunteers didn't know.

FORMAL TRAINING EVENTS AND OTHER SPEAKING ENGAGEMENTS TO EQUIP PEOPLE TO BECOME PEACEMAKERS AND BETTER ENGAGE WITH THOSE OF OTHER FAITHS

In Sandpoint, Idaho our staff showed up to give a training on refugee resettlement only to find that the event had been taken over by protestors shouting things like "speak American!" and spewing vitriol against Muslims. Those who earnestly came to learn were outnumbered and shouted down, and the opportunity for fruitful conversation was quickly squelched.

However, as a result of the hatred on display in this meeting, a local church decided to reaffirm its commitment to stand up against prejudice and hatred, and this seemingly ill-fated training actually became a catalyst for peace.

Iftar dinners (the daily evening meal at which Muslims break the day's fast during Ramadan) is one of the most common times to visit the mosque. Each year we partner with local Islamic Centers and personal friends to organize many of these events, at which Christians can share a meal with their Muslim neighbors, learn about Ramadan, or simply connect and make new friendships.

PEACE CATALYST INTERNATIONAL

Peace Catalyst President Rick Love took peacemaking to one of the worst conflict zones in the world: Israel/Palestine. He taught at Bethlehem Bible College to a class of Palestinian Christians, and one student responded by saying, "I grew up in the church and know hundreds of Bible verses. But I have never heard peacemaking taught with such clarity."


Peace Catalyst staff also traveled to Jordan and, in partnership with Islamic Help in Amman, distributed food, clothing, and heating fuel to 1200 Syrian refugees on the Jordanian border. This year we launched our long-term peacemaking presence in Bosnia & Herzegovina with peacemaking staff members permanently established in the region. The country's population is comprised of Muslim and Christian ethnic groups with a history of tensions, violent conflict, war, and genocide. We've formed meaningful connections with survivors of the violence, imams, and local peacemaking leaders and have been partnering with local efforts to build understanding between ethnic groups and promote non-violence.



Our overseas peacemaking work also includes Indonesia, and in August of this year our stateside peacemaker Thomas Davis traveled to Indonesia to partner with our Indonesia-based team as well as to connect with existing peacemakers and pioneer new relationships in the country. These connections included Governor Irfan Prayitno, university students seeking to start a peacemaking movement in their city, and a major Indonesian Islamic network.
